



Budding Artists' Chance to Blossom

Budding young artists from across Hetton are being given the chance to blossom in a special art competition.

As part of its commitment to involve residents of all ages in the area's Northumbria in Bloom activities, Hetton Town Council has launched a special children's painting competition. Children have been challenged to paint their interpretation of the floral competition – The Hetton Viewpoint.

There are five different age categories (6 years and under, 7-9 years, 10-11 years, 12-13 years and 14-16 years) with winners in each category receiving a gift voucher and certificate.

The competition is being promoted to all local schools with all those taking part earning a £50 voucher towards school funds.

Closing date for entries is Friday July 3. Entries must be handed into the Town Council Offices at The Hetton Centre and a panel of Town councillors will select the winners.

All entries will be on display during the Hetton Festival - Saturday and Sunday July 18 and 19. Winning entries will also be framed and displayed in the Hetton Centre.

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Works Going Swimmingly

Work is progressing well at the 25 metre pool development in Hetton, and significant progress has already been made on site with the steel frame and concrete tanks of both the 25m main and learner pools now complete.

The installation of the Glulam beams that support the roof structure above the main pool hall

is nearing completion, and work will begin shortly on the preparatory work for the pool spraying, along with the first fix of the pool pipe work.

The project team is working closely with Grit and Pearl Public Art consultants to develop plans that will see a public art feature installed within the glazing of the entrance foyer, or incorporated into

the exterior glazing along the main pool hall.

The theme of the artwork will reflect Hetton's strong mining heritage, allowing us to reflect upon the past, whilst looking forward to the future.

The project is on schedule, and is due for completion and opening to the public in late 2009, or early 2010.



People's pennies invested in Hetton's future

A safer, brighter and more attractive area is being secured thanks to a small investment from households in the Hetton Town Council area.

Local people elected by their communities also make sure that the grass root views of 16,000 local residents living in 6,800 homes are heard and their interests protected, by giving their time free to serve as Town Councillors.

Low interest rates might be the norm at the moment but members of Hetton Town Council make sure that every household in their area reaps a maximum return on their investment – the paying of the special precept to support the work of the council.

Most properties in Hetton are in the Band A category and only pay £8.51 a year to fund the Town Council – just 16p a week. The last year has seen that investment

reap dividends for local people through:

- The awarding of more than 20 grants to local community groups and individuals including those supporting the elderly, sports lovers, schools, musicians and other grass roots groups.
- A phased renewal of street furniture which has already seen new seating in Hetton's Front Street and Easington Lane's High Street.
- Safer streets and reduced anti-social behaviour through partnership working with Sunderland City Council to introduce closed circuit television cameras in the district.
- The staging of the crowd pulling Hetton Festival and Hetton Public Fireworks displays as well as the sparkling Hetton Christmas Illuminations.
- Attractive streets and public

places thanks to Hetton's award-winning Northumbria in Bloom displays.

• Production and circulation of the popular quarterly Hetton Town Courier newsletter, designed to keep everyone up-to-date on what the council is doing and give information on local events.

The annual precept has been collected at the same time as council tax since 1974 from households in Hetton district which originally were in the boundaries of the old Hetton Urban District Council.

The move is all part of the council's drive to give local residents the opportunity to express their views on issues that might affect them.

At each of the council's finance and full council meetings the Mayor will give the public present the opportunity to make their views known or to suggest new ideas they'd like Town Councillors to consider.

Your item may be discussed immediately or noted, and discussed at a later meeting. If you have minor issues or those that need dealing with urgent i.e. street lights not working or litter problems you should write a short note outlining the issue and leave it at the town council's offices in the Hetton Centre where it will be dealt with immediately.
